

World Team Tennis (WTT) Hybrid Rosters

WTT team rosters can be hybrid, meaning that there can be a mix of ratings as long as the average rating of the top two rated men plus the top two rated women does not exceed the level of the league. A few examples of hybrid teams are listed below.

Example 1:

4.5 man	3.5 woman
4.5 man	3.5 woman
4.0 man	3.5 woman
4.0 man	3.0 woman

The average of the top two men ($4.5 + 4.5$) plus the top two women ($3.5 + 3.5$) = $16/4 = 4.0$. This team would play in the 4.0 division.

Example 2:

4.0 man	3.5 woman
3.5 man	3.0 woman
3.5 man	3.0 woman

The average of the top two men ($4.0 + 3.5$) plus the top two women ($3.5 + 3.0$) = $14/4 = 3.5$. This team would play in the 3.5 division.

Example 3:

4.5 man	4.5 woman
3.5 man	3.5 woman
3.5 man	3.0 woman

The average of the top two men ($4.5 + 3.5$) plus the top two women ($4.5 + 3.5$) = $16/4 = 4.0$. This team would play in the 4.0 division.

Example 4:

5.0 man	3.0 woman
5.0 man	3.0 woman
4.0 man	2.5 woman
4.0 man	2.5 woman

The average of the top two men ($5.0 + 5.0$) plus the top two women ($3.0 + 3.0$) = $16/4 = 4.0$. This team would play in the 4.0 division.

- Teams can also be comprised of all 4.0 men/3.0 women (3.5 level) or all 4.5 men/3.5 women (4.0 level) or vice-versa.
- Teams comprised of players at level can also include players who are “playing up”.
- Players can’t be rated more than one point above the level they’re playing in.
- Ratings are only considered for roster purposes, not in the lineup. For example, with the first hybrid example team above, the 4.5 man and 4.5 woman can partner together in mixed doubles.
